Last year I was fortunate enough to be able to work with and get to know a number of our Juniors. All of these youngsters are avid exhibitors and competent horsemen and women. All deserve our acknowledgement and praise for the fine sportsmanship they exhibit throughout the year. And so, it is with great pleasure that I present to you our Junior Exhibitors.

First a word or two on the winners of the Canadian Hackney Society Junior Exhibitor Competition.

Dennis Alderman took the top honours this year winning at St. Catharines, and the C.N.E. Dennis has been showing his father's ponies, Laudydale Rajah and Cambridge Ringleader, with great success in both this Competition and in open classes at our numerous fairs. This year we saw him show Mr. Sedore's yearling, Lockburns

Prime Minister, to win his class at the C.N.E., The Royal and a reserve in the futurities. The Aldermans have great faith in his ability and have encouraged him to take the ponies and horses to the fairs when his father has been unable to attend. Their faith was justified; he came home with the ponies undefeated and several reds for the horses. Softball and hockey keep him busy between shows and chores. He attends Grimsby Secondary School where he is specializing in electricity with an eye on electrical engineering in the future. Congratulations Dennis on a fine season.

Miss Debbie Brown of Ottawa was reserve Champion in this difficult class. She showed the DeeBee Farms open pony, Cracker's Princess, to win the Competition at Ormstown, Que., and Ottawa. She was just eight yrs. old when she first showed her saddle pony and is now kept busy showing her three-gaited saddle horse Night Mist as well as "Crackers". Debbie is sixteen and in Grade 11, an active cheerleader, and modern dancer. She has served as president and treasurer of a girl's youth group and if this wasn't enough she is also studying grade eight music. Debbie is a prime example of our youth today and we wish her the best in all her ventures. Watch for Debbie and "Cracker's" next year, they make quite a pair.



Perhaps our American readers are wondering why saddle ponies are pictured here, so I should point out to you that ponies in Canada in the childrens classes whether parade, 3 gaited, combination, fancy turnout, governess cart, western, roadster, or pleasure are almost excusively Hackney. We even have the odd one that jumps. As most of the Juniors featured here show their ponies in all these classes, I thought, that perhaps, a more accurate picture would be maintained by showing the versitility of both the ponies and their young owners. Walk, trot, canter, parade gait, race, jump, ride or drive they do it all in Canada and do it well. To top it all off these ponies are all kept in training by the Juniors themselves.



Thirteen year old Cathy Joyce was the winner of the Junior Exhibitor Competition at Kingston. She started her show career when only four and at this tender age she drove her Welsh pony Prince Charming to a third and a fourth at the Royal Winter Fair. "Doc" a half-hackney was the next pony and Cathy piloted him to Zone I reserve Champion in 1969. Then came The Doctor, an impressive hackney pinto who has proved to be one of the most successful childs pony showing today. Cathy and The Doctor have won the 1970 Zone I championship 12.2 & under and reserve champion saddle seat equitation 17 and under. Dufferin Rocket is her over pony and was champion harness pony at the Central Canada Exposition. Both these ponies show in a number of divisions and are placed consistantly in the ribbons. Glenlights Magic Crown, a homebred Arbian, is another winner for Cathy. Besides showing she attends grade 8 at Glenburnie Public School, plays for the schools champion volleyball team and is an active swimmer, truly a versitile young lady.



Don't know whether to say lucky or unlucky Jim Kelly as he is the only boy in the Kelly family of five. Cecil and Pat are from Ottawa and the proud parents of this fine brood. Always hackney enthusiast they keep two ponies for the kids to show. At fourteen Jim is the oldest and with High Society Babe has won the Zone I Championship or reserve three times in the last four years. Jim and his thirteen year old sister Lawrie feel they have outgrown Babe for the '72 season and for this reason she is for sale. Besides working his pony daily, Jim finds time to play hockey and lacrosse. Lawrie has also outgrown her pony King Tutt but still plans to show him in the Governess Cart next year leaving the riding duties to Nancy, eleven, and Sandra who is ten. Last but not least is Mary Jane who is all of five. To her falls the job of cooling out King Tutt. and, of course, she is the passenger in the Governess Cart. Enthusiastic snowmobilers' the winter week-ends usually find the seven Kelly's back in the bush on a weiner roast.



A grade eight student at Metcalfe Public School and a member of the school executive; she is also on the Volleyball, floor hockey and broomball teams. Sister Sandra is twelve and climaxed this year with a blue at the Royal in the Governess Cart with her Hackney pony Cambridge Golden Nuggett. In 1970 this pair was Zone I under 12.2 reserve champion. Under saddle or in harness they have placed first or second consistantly throughout the year. In the Junior Competition at Kingston Sandra and Brenda placed second and third respectfully. Jimmeny Cricket is shared by both these girls in classes ranging from jumping to harness and they won their share of ribbons in all these divisions.

Thirteen yr. old Eddie also sees action in the show ring. He showed harness ponies in '69 & '70, however, it appears that his interests have switched to western classes. He has had some success showing the former harness pony Andy's Show Boy in this division. An avid hockey player he plays center for the Greely Royals and is in Grade 7 at Metcalfe Public School.
